A project by Alice Angus exploring the history and future of local and independent traders in Lancaster.



I sport time with traders to have conversations, collect audio interviews, make drawings and take photographs which have drawing and digital printing on fabric. As It Comes, by Alice Angus, is part of Talking Shopl a creative regeneration programme, run by Mid Pennine Arts since 2005, engaging creative practitioners to work with independent businesses to highlight their importance as hubs of their local communities.
